Connecting Individual and Societal Change

Parsons viewed social change at two levels, firstly, change which emerges from processes within the social system, and secondly, the processes of change of the social system itself.

Social change can evolve from a number of different sources, including contact with other societies (diffusion), changes in the ecosystem (which can cause the loss of natural resources or widespread disease), technological change (epitomized by the Industrial Revolution, which created a new social group, the urban proletariat), and population growth and other demographic variables. Social change is also spurred by ideological, economic, and political movements.

Social change can be referred to as the transformation of a group's customs, beliefs, laws and institutions. Social change can occur in two ways: progressively/positive change or digressively/negative change. In progressive change, the community abandons strange customs, such as barbarism and adopts universally accepted norms (civilization).
